## LABOR IN POLITIOS.

The Subcommittee of the Central Labor Union's Political Committee met last evening at No. 141 Eighth-street. The committee is composed of one member from each Assembly district in the city. It decided to organize labor political clubs in every Assembly district. These clubs will canvas the various election districts in favor of Henry George for Mayor. The labor friends of Henry George recently held a meeting in Eighth-street and prepared blanks for the signatures of citizens who desire that George shall be chosen Mayor, and have already begun circulating them.

It is said that a secret meeting of members of the Home Club, and of other labor agitators, was held at the house of James Archibald, of the Home Club, about four weeks ago, and that the question of running George for Mayor was discussed. The Home Club men especially urged his nomination, and offered a guarantee that Mr. George, if elected, would be guided by the Home Club. It was finally decided to push forward Mr. George by every means in their power. When Mr. George was spoken to about the matter he denied that he had made any promises whatever to the Home Club. Nevertheless Thomas B. Maguire, one of its head men, is warmly advocating Mr. George's nomination.
