

**WILL SUPPORT HENRY GEORGE.**

At a meeting of the Central Labor Union yesterday a resolution was adopted recommending to its political conference to nominate Henry George as its candidate for Mayor, The organization promised to support him morally and financially. The delegates from the clerks' section stated that they would soon hold a mass meeting at Cooper Institute and agitate for early closing. The union newsdealers asked for and obtained leave to use the seal of the Central Labor Union at their news stands. Delegate Jablonowski announced that the old Cigarmakers' Progressive Union, No. 1, was already consolidated with the International Union, and had adopted the name of Cigarmakers' Progressive International Union, No. 90. A delegate from the brushmakers announced that a strike had taken place at the shop of Henry Rosenthal & Brother for an advance of wages. The matter was referred to the Arbitration Committee. The window shade painters said that they had struck in the factory of Cloes & Co., in Jersey City. The shoe salesmen asked the meeting to send a committee to Mayor Grace, and ask him to enforce the law against Sunday trading. Two delegates from the Verplanck brickmakers complained that the firms of Avery and of Frank Timmony employed scab workmen in their yards, and asked that all union bricklayers be requested not to use bricks made by them. Two hundred dollars was voted to the striking canal boatmen.

It was announced that the Americus Labor Club had sent \$100 to help defray the expenses for securing a new trial to the condemned Chicago Anarchists.

The Central Labor Union of Brooklyn held a meeting yesterday at the Labor Lyceum, in Myrtle-street, and received the report of the delegates from the Syracuse Convention, which recommended that labor organizations should indorse one pledged candidate. A resolution approving of the recommendation was passed.
