BOYS LESS BELLIGERENT.

Cincinnati Strikers Under Control—End of Troubles at New York and Pittsburg.

Cincinnati, Ohio, July 26.—The messenger boys' strike was continued to-day, but the lawlessness attending it heretofore was much lessened by more active work of the police. Several new messengers were attacked and beaten early to-day, but the police rendered prompt assistance. Throughout the day policemen escorted the messengers and no crowds were allowed to collect. The newsboys' strike was called off, as the afternoon newspapers have yielded to their demands.

Pittsburg, Pa., July 26.—The strike of Western Union Telegraph messengers ended to-day, and the boys are all at work again. They claim that the company has promised to concede their demands, but this is denied by the officials.

New York, July 26.—The messenger boys' strike has not been officially declared off, for there is no leader and committee to make such announcement, but the strike is at an end as far as inconveniencing the companies, or there being any considerable number of strikers is concerned.

Richmond, Va., July 26.—It is reported to-night that the Western Union Telegraph messenger boys here have organized a strike for an increase in the rates of pay they receive, and that the strike will go into effect in the morning.
